PICK A TREE: Find a tree you want to learn more about.


DRAW THE TREE:

TREE IDENTIFICATION: Now that you have learned to describe your tree. Can you identify it's common or scientific name? Research at your library or on your computer to find out what type of tree you have.

YOUR TREE TYPE:
Can you see the roots?
What do they do?
Can you find the stems?
What do they do?
Can you see the bark?
What does it do and what does it look like?
Can you find the leaves? What do they do?
Can you find the flowers or fruits? What do they do?
Can you find growth on the tree?
Can you find decay?
Can you find any animals on the tree? What about decomposers? (Fungi, insects, bacteria)

Key terms to help you describe your tree



LEAVES: Chlorophyll is the green color in leaves. Sometimes the bark is green like in the Palo Verde tree.

SIMPLE LEAF: one blade that is not divided into leaflets.	COMPOUND LEAF: has two or more leaflets
Does your tree have pine needles?	
DRAW A LEAF FROM YOUR TREE:	
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A LEAF MARGIN is the outer age of the leaf blade. Here are some examples:		
	entire	serrate
What leaf margin does your tree have?	undulate	lobed
